Geography: Where in the World? ANSWER KEY

Agent Skye Miles has a **capital (hint that you need to find world capitals)** interest in world travel, and recently began to draft her very own travel guide! She hit a snag, however, when her dog, Jet, chewed it up. Now all that's left are a few fragments, **all broken up and scrambled (hint that the names of the capitals will be scrambled and split into more than 1 word)**, plus some sets of coordinates and half of the page with the world map. She should have **spelled it out more clearly (hint that the solver needs to spell out letters)** to Jet that he wasn't allowed in her home office. Whatever is she to do?

- 1. Hel<u>lo! Use</u> this guide to aid you on your trip around the world. (Seoul)
- No matter your vacat<u>ion ha</u>bits, we're sure you'll find something useful in this guide. (Hanoi)
- If it <u>took y</u>ou years to save up enough money for a trip, you'll want to make the most of it! (Tokyo)
- 4. Travelling can be scary, but in this guide, I'll teach you to channel your in<u>ner b</u>rave soul!

- 5. No need to set your plans in stone; you ca<u>n amend a j</u>ourney as it unfolds. (N'Djamena)
- 6. Also, only pack what you'll absolutely need. (Oslo)
- When in a major metropolis, take advantage of the subway in order to avoid traffic or <u>a</u>ccidents. (Cairo)
- 8. If you're going to a 5-star restaurant, arrive in suit and tie. (Tunis)

- 15. A beachtour makes sense on a hot day. (Khartoum)
- 16. If your <u>skin has a</u> red tint after a day out, you should apply more sunscreen the next day. (Kinshasa)

17. I hope you truly <u>did mar</u>vel at all of the wonderful sights you saw on your trip! (Madrid)

Extraction: Once the solver has found every world capital hidden in the sentences, they plot them on the world map and number them according to which item it was from (i.e. Seoul is 1, Hanoi is 2, etc.) Easy mode can have dots already plotted at each capital, needing only to be assigned the corresponding numbers by the solver. When plotted, the map will look like this:



Then all that's left to do is use the coordinates to do a dot-to-dot! Each set in parentheses is one letter; each column of parentheses is a word. Numbers separated by a comma mean "draw a line

from A to B"; a semicolon means "pick up your pencil." When this is done for each set of coordinates, you get the phrase **WHERE'S THE BEEF**, the answer to this puzzle!
